I conducted a futuring/strategic planning retreat, wrote an initial report, met with them to refine and follow-up on the findings and then to help them move toward implementation. Significant time was donated to the county, and services provided at 80% normal fee, due to the worthiness of their services.

However, I turned down any remuneration and volunteered all of my time to this worthy cause.

Worked with them in the Spring and then in the Fall planned and directed a Strategic Planning Exercise for the Coalition. In late August of 2005 I worked with them again on a follow-up session to consider progress resulting from the previous fall's work.

Consultant - 2000-01. Hired by Erie County to work with the Office of Children and Youth on a project to deal with the issue of diversity. This project involved: research into best practices, analysis of what they had done in the past several years of working on this issue, designing a ballot that captured the various solutions one of their committees had discussed in the past year, and then conducting a futuring session. The results from that session were then analyzed, organized, and presented to the participants as well as to a leadership group.

Consultant - 1998-1999. Hired by Erie County as a consultant on The Visitation Project. The purpose of this project was to improve the outcomes for children placed in foster care in Erie County. This involved assisting them in the design of extensive survey instruments, cover letters, and processes. I then compiled and analyzed the data, and presented these results to all of the groups involved: Management, Direct Service staff, and Foster Parents. Significant time was donated to the County.

Consultant - 1997. Was hired as a consultant and facilitator by Erie County Department of Human Services / Mercyhurst Institute for Child and Family Policy to help with the 1997 Consolidated Application for U.S. HUD Continuum of Care Homeless Assistance monies. This involved conducting a futuring session, review and analysis of data collected, working on the development of an RFP, and assistance with the narrative. Significant time was also volunteered to this endeavor. Later, I was one of seven members on the Selection Committee reading and grading proposals for inclusion in the Erie County Consolidated Application for funds available under the HUD 1997 Continuum of Care Homeless Assistance.

This involved training community leaders from Lava Hot Springs and Teton County, Idaho. The training facilitated goal-setting, decision making, and conflict resolution.
